DIRECTOR'S WELCOME

elcome to the 2023 SCiP Alliance Annual Conference: Identity Matters.

As ever, the diversity of our community brings a wealth of expertise and depth of commitment to our vision of thriving lives for Service children. Together we will explore the distinctive, diverse and dynamic identities of children and young people from serving and ex-Armed Forces families by sharing our own good practice, learning from others and developing new collaborations and action. And most importantly, by hearing the experiences of Service children in their own words.

This collective and collaborative effort is all-the-more important when considering the role and significance of identity. Research, school curricula, national policy, multipartner collaborations – everything we do – interacts with identity in a two-way conversation: we want a secure and fulfilling future for each child and young person while our best work provides an enabling scaffold for every individual to explore and develop what they want for their lives.

The progress of the Alliance reflects this appreciation. Alongside the challenges, our theory of change acknowledges the potential for development that can flow from the unique Armed Forces lifestyle. Our asset-based approach helps to guard against deficit-focused thinking and work, which limits ambitions, restricts solutions and problematises children and young people's lives. The Thriving Lives Toolkit – already at work in schools and under development for early years, colleges and universities - embeds in assessment and practice improvement, not a one-size-fits-all mentality, but a nuanced and personal appreciation of the complexity of each individual's life with a focus on listening to their voices, engaging with their families and equipping their supporters.

Further, every Hub in the Network responds to the call to 'do together what we cannot do alone' and the new Hub Handbook encourages partners to explore what Service children's needs look like uniquely in their area. That responsiveness to local context is now the norm for nearly 1,000 professionals in the Network and is made possible through the stewardship of over 20 allies in 12 Hubs. Individuals can receive enhanced tailored support at higher education thanks to the recently introduced option to self-

identify as a Service child through UCAS applications while the higher education research we published last month provides an important reminder that the most common number of Service children on roll in a school is one.

The tension between what Service children share as a group and the unique experiences of each individual, is at the heart of what we are exploring today but must remain at the front of our thinking over the long-term. We must find ways to enhance the framework of national policy so that it enables responsiveness in regional, local, and organisational practice. In that context, we must support the community of professionals - our community - to champion sustained, inclusive and tailored support that recognises the distinctive nature of service in the Armed Forces and to respond meaningfully to the diverse and dynamic experiences of each individual child and young person.

THE EXPLORATION OF STUDENT VOICE WITHIN UNIVERSITY OUTREACH

Tian Barratt, Widening Participation Outreach Manager, University of Portsmouth Clair Martin & Steve Baker. Seekers Create

The University of Portsmouth recently collaborated with social creative Seekers Create, to explore student voice, as part of their Creative Forces events with Service children. The gamification of student voice, facilitated by Seekers Create, resulted in a vast amount of written, drawn, and oral data reflecting on service child identity. Some of which, is being turned into legacy resources. Learning is being used to continue collaboration with a small group of service children who are helping to co-design our future Creative Forces programme. This workshop will include an overview of the project and collaboration with Seekers Create and a local school. Seekers Create will then apply their unique doodle-methodology to facilitate a practical activity; capturing insights and reflections on the conference theme of 'identity' in a way that is fun, engaging, and explorative, and showcases the ways in which delegates can engage with Seekers Create within their own settings.

TRANSLATING CHILD-CENTERED CREATIVE RESEARCH METHODS INTO THE SCHOOL CONTEXT

Lucy Robinson, Doctoral Researcher, Department of Education, University of Oxford

This workshop will take an aspect of ongoing PhD research, creative research methods, and explain how these were used by research participants (Service children aged between 9-16) to explore their service child identities. This research centres Service children and is underpinned by the values of voice research by using creative methods as research methodology and taking an innovative approach to explore Service children's identities.

CONVERSATIONS ABOUT SUPPORT FOR CHILDREN FROM MILITARY FAMILIES: EXCITING POSSIBILITIES

Dr Anne Chappell, Head of the Department of Education, Brunel University London Dr Ellen McHugh, Senior Lecturer in the Department of Education, Brunel University London

It is widely known within the SCiP community that the complex lives of children growing up in a military family create unique opportunities and challenges. In order to consider the impact of these experiences on 'identity matters', we are bringing together in this workshop the outcomes of conversations between researchers at Brunel University London and those working to support these young people in practice contexts. We will outline the findings from research that has explored the experiences of grown-up children from military families and the ways in which these accounts illustrate the possibilities for interventions, including therapeutic work, to support current children from military families. Delegates' knowledge and understanding of this unique group of children will be enhanced and the session will illustrate what future support is needed and what it could look like.

SUPPORTING BEREAVED SERVICE CHILDREN

Lorna Vyse, Families Team - Projects, Scotty's Little Soldiers

This workshop will explore the unique challenges faced by children and young people (0-25 years) who have experienced the death of a parent who served in the British Armed Forces. It will consider the impact of the loss of military identity for those children and provide an overview of the work of Scotty's Little Soldiers, which was set up in 2010 to ensure those children are not disadvantaged as a result of their bereavement. Scotty's support bereaved children of both serving personnel and veterans - this workshop will also highlight the differences in support between these two groups.

POSITIVE PATHWAYS THROUGH PURPOSEFUL PARTNERSHIPS

Kelly Wales, Education and Skills Liaison, Forces Employment Charity Sarah Harder-Collins, Deputy Director Student Support and Success, University of Winchester Corianne Gjertsen, Transitions Coordinator and Student Advisor, University of Winchester

This workshop will showcase case studies of young people who are currently being supported by the Forces Employment Charity. It aims to provide an understanding of why Service children require additional one-toone career support, which is tailored to their specific needs. During the workshop, we will discuss the barriers and challenges faced by Service children and the importance of allowing them to identify themselves as Service children. By doing so, they will have access to a holistic bespoke support package that helps them increase confidence and self-awareness and achieve positive vocational outcomes.

TORNADO OF CHANGE - FROM MILITARY TO CIVILIAN CHILD

Nina Collins, Children and Young People's Participation Manager, Forces Children Scotland Gary Seath, Marketing, Communications and Development Manager, Forces Children Scotland

Forces Children Scotland will present its Combined Force co-production methodology and how it was applied to work directly with young people to creatively explore changes in identity when a parent decides to leave the armed forces. The workshop will focus on the charity's recent Tornado of Change Campaign and delegates will hear from young people and the wider team involved about the immersive, creative process completed to co-produce three impactful conceptual videos. Delegates will join the young people and team to participate in creative activities to further explore the theme of identity, based on the campaign's three predominant themes.

ARMED FORCES YOUNG CARERS IDENTITIES AND IDENTIFICATION: **RESEARCH AND PRACTICE**

Helen Leadbitter, Director, Young Carers Initiative Dr Paul Watson, Assistant Director of the Northern Hub for Veterans and Military Families, Research Assistant Professor in Nursing & Specialist Community Public Health Nursing, Northumbria University

This workshop will present evidence from both research and practice of the hidden nature of Service children young carers. Informed by young carers themselves from across Tri-Service Armed Forces families of how the impacts of caring roles can be compounded by factors linked specifically with military life, such as mobility and deployment becoming barriers to their identification for support. By understanding and listening to the hidden voices of Service children young carers, how they consider their identity and how they can inform tools and resources for military welfare, family federations and external agencies to improve recognition and support young carers.

CHAMPIONING THE SERVICE CHILD

Angela Campbell, Service Children's Champion North Yorkshire Council

This workshop will explore the common and diverse experiences of Service children and young people, whilst also looking at inspiring ways to engage with schools, families and the wider community. Looking at the different ways North Yorkshire have engaged and celebrated Service children and young people and the positive impact of projects, such as 'Service Children's Community Choir', 'Welcome to Our World', 'Armed Forces Day for children' and the annual 'Festival of Remembrance'.

THE RT HON DR ANDREW MURRISON MP

Parliamentary Under Secretary of State (Minister for Defence People, Veterans and Service Families), Ministry of Defence

Dr Andrew Murrison was appointed Parliamentary Under Secretary of State at the Ministry of Defence on 30 October 2022, being responsible for all policy matters relating to civilian and service personnel, service families and MOD owned veteran services. Andrew served for 18 years as a medical officer in the Royal Navy, leaving in October 2000 as a Surgeon Commander. In 2003 he was recalled to serve in Irag and in 2021 was mobilised to lead vaccination teams as part of Operation Rescript. He remains an active reservist.





Philip was a secondary school teacher before leading a regional higher education access partnership. He founded a social enterprise championing whole-person, whole journey approaches and co-founded the National Network for the Education of Care Leavers, also leading its spin-out as a charity. He has worked throughout the UK and in Australia on progression for under-represented and vulnerable groups, was an adviser to England's access regulator, and has lead research, training and advisory work with schools, colleges, universities and agencies on factors impacting on thriving through the life-course. Philip has been Director of the SCiP Alliance since establishing it in 2016, after leading the research-practice project that laid its foundations.

Service Children's Champion, North Yorkshire Council servicechildrenschampion.co.uk

Angela was a primary school teacher before taking on the role of Service Children's Champion for North Yorkshire Council. She established the Service Children's Community Choir to give children from military families a voice and an opportunity to be proud of their identity. Angela worked in close collaboration with Never Such Innocence to take 33 of their choir members to London to audition for Britain's Got Talent culminating with them performing in the live semi-finals. Angela is chair of the Service Children's Network, hosting termly meetings where schools, military representatives and other professionals can come together to share updates and best practice whilst also providing free CPD. As Service Children's Champion, Angela has projectmanaged large-scale events which bring children together so that they can celebrate who they are.

Lizzie continues to advocate for the Service child having sat on the SCIP Alliance Board since January 2022 alongside volunteering across the sector to raise awareness of the experiences of Service young people, with a special interest in Higher Education.



On leaving the Armed Forces, Paul completed a BSc in Mental Health nursing, specialising in children's mental health nursing in 2013. Paul then went on to complete a Post Graduate Diploma in Specialist Community Public Health Nursing (School Nurse) in 2014. Paul was appointed the school nurse for Catterick Military Garrison. On leaving clinical practice Paul went into higher education. Paul is currently an Assistant Professor in children and young people's health, Specialist Public Health Nursing (School Nursing and Health Visiting) and Assistant Director of the Northern Hub for Military and Veterans Family Research at Northumbria University, with a growing portfolio of research on the emotional health and wellbeing of Military connected children and young people, PTSD and social isolation and loneliness in the veteran population, military connected suicide, and is an expert in narrative methodologies. Moreover, Dr Watson completed his PhD in 2022, titled: The experiences of being a young carer of a veteran parent with PTSD: A narrative enquiry.

After managing the project for two years she moved to Forces Children Scotland in 2018 to develop their participation work and since then has supported a variety of projects to amplify the voices of children and young people from serving and veteran families. She is constantly inspired by the creativity, passion and dedication that the children and young people bring to Forces Children Scotland's work.



THRIVING LIVES TOOL KIT

The toolkit is now available online here: https://thrivinglives. scipalliance.org/

Underpinned by rigorous research and thoroughly tested in schools, the Thriving Lives Toolkit provides schools with a framework of 7 principles through which to reflect on their practice and a 3-tier set of CPD resources. The resources in this toolkit have been developed in collaboration with a range of partners across the UK, and consist of:

- An introductory animation
- A detailed resource introducing the evidence base, what schools can do to support their Service children and who can help and;
- School case studies.



The Service Children's Progression Alliance conducted a large-scale UK-wide consultation which told us that professionals supporting Armed Forces children want to be better connected: with each other, with evidence and with support. The Thriving Lives Toolkit responds directly to this need.

The research identified seven principles for effective practice and a framework to help schools undertake evidence-based reflection and identify improvement priorities. Research does not identify any principle to be of more importance than any others.

Can I just say how invaluable the thriving Lives Toolkit has been in monitoring our provision for our Service children. It is a fantastic auditing tool the we use regularly, and we will be updating it again soon.

THRIVING LIVES TOOLKIT **DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS:**

Family Survey Tool - To be used by schools to secure Service children's and families' voices, and inform their Toolkit self-assessment. It is intended that this will be used by schools to improve their understanding of, and support provided to, their Service children.

Upgraded case study bank - A searchable bank of case studies and guidance where school staff can assess their progress by learning from others well-evidenced examples.

Toolkit expansion from Early Years to Higher Education - A Thriving Lives Toolkit suite, covering children and young people aged from 0-25. The suite will set a new standard for evidence-based support for Service children, transforming the capacity of providers to understand Service children's complex lives, identify their unique (and greatest) needs and develop and continually enhance targeted support.

SCIP ALLIANCE HUB NETWORK

The UK-wide Hub Network epitomises our priority of partnership by helping allies to do together what they cannot do alone. Since 2019, the Hub Network has grown in size, activity and impact: There are currently 12 Hubs across the UK, with a Kent and Medway Hub launching soon.
